Plastic Free July

Living in Florida, we have a special relationship with our environment. We are proud of our beaches and wetlands and the animals and humans that live in and around them. We realize that we must protect our world in order to keep us all healthy and happy. According to earthday.org, each year "we produce 400 million tons of plastic waste and less than 8 percent is recycled. Every minute, every day, we buy one million plastic bottles, and each year we use five trillion plastic bags, almost all of which end up in our rivers, oceans, our food, and our landfills. Plastic is now in our blood stream, attaching itself to our heart, lungs, kidneys, and brains. Plastic particles can last for thousands of years."

What can we do to help? Take a pledge to join Plastic Free July. Plastic Free July was founded in 2011 by Rebecca Prince-Ruiz as a grassroots campaign to raise awareness about plastic pollution. Since then, the movement has grown, and in 2021, participants reduced 2.1 million tons of waste. Will you be part of Plastic Free July by choosing to refuse single-use plastics?

- Use a reusable water bottle instead of buying plastic bottles or water.
- Avoid single-use plastic bags when packing lunches or putting away leftovers.

Shoe 3 School Supply Drive

Every parent knows that purchasing school supplies and clothing each year can really stress a family's budget. For families that struggle to even put food on the table, school

supplies are a luxury that they often can't afford. That's where our club hopes to make a difference this month!

Through the month of July, our club will be collecting donations of school supplies and new sneakers. Donations will be given to the Sharing Center of Central Brevard, Friends of Children of Brevard, and Grandparents Raising Grandchildren. Be sure to ask your friends and neighbors to participate so we can increase our donations.

The Sharing Center of Central Brevard's "KICKS FOR KIDS" campaign collects new sneakers to give to elementary students in Central Brevard. The recipients are identified by local principals and teachers as in-need and the Sharing Center ensures those kids receive brand new shoes within the first few weeks of school. The Sharing Center is asking for good quality, closed toed sneakers. The GIRLS need sizes 1 through 6 (size 4 and size 5 are most needed) and the BOYS need sizes 1 through 6 (size 2 and size 3 are most needed).

Friends of Children of Brevard raises funds to provide for the unmet needs of abused, neglected or abandoned children in Brevard County. Their mission is to "improve the lives of the abused, abandoned and neglected children of Brevard County Florida and to support their advocates from the Guardian Ad Litem Program." School supply donations will help foster families provide for the children in their care.

Grandparents Raising Grandchildren of Brevard County Florida's mission is "to reduce the number of at-risk children and ensure permanency by providing advocacy, support, training, and referral services to relative care families." They "work directly with relative families to develop and demonstrate practical solutions to safely reduce the need for foster care, to improve the well-being of every child in their care."

Did you know that dragonflies are a great method of mosquito control? Adult dragonflies can eat more than one hundred mosquitos every day. Planting some native flowering plants around your yard such as coreopsis leavenworthii (common tickseed) Galliardia pulchella (Blanketflower), Salvia coccinea (Tropical Sage) will encourage dragonflies to visit your yard and naturally eliminate pesky mosquitos.

GFWC History

The seventh International President of GFWC was Anna Pennybacker of Texas. She served GFWC from 1912-1916.

Born Anna J. Hardwicke on May 7, 1861 in Petersburg, Virginia, she moved with her family to Texas when she was seventeen years old. After graduating from the Normal Institute of Huntsville, Anna taught at Bryan Grammar School.

On October 31, 1884, Anna married Percy Pennybacker and they moved to Tyler, Texas, where he became school superintendent and appointed her as history teacher and principal at Central High School. In 1888, she published A New History of Texas for Schools, which was adopted as the official text for public schools.

Mrs. Pennybacker began her woman's club involvement in Texas as one of the first members of The First Literary in Austin. She was the Texas State President for two years. During that time, she helped clubs raise \$3,500 for the endowment of a free scholarship at Texas University to ensure that in each class there would be a representative of the Texas Federation. Anna went on to serve GFWC as treasurer and auditor before becoming International President in 1912.

In 1913, she stated at the American Peace Conference that the current method of celebrating Independence Day in the United States was a "travesty." Anna suggested that "children form floral processions at school buildings, march to some central point which would be made the scene of a general celebration, in which places of honor would be given to young men who have arrived at the age of 21 within the year." She further advocated that speeches should be made to these young men and that civic oaths containing peace clauses should be administered. The committee also agreed that fireworks would not be a part of the festivities. They were declared too great a menace to life and property and the money spent would not offset the "unpleasantness."

Also in 1913, she urged that measures be taken to enforce the 1906 Pure Food and Drug Act. At the GFWC Convention in Nebraska she

stated that "We have the law but the agricultural department has no police authority to enforce it. Enforcement is the one thing lacking to obtaining clean meat, bread, and milk. These are big problems and worthy of the best efforts of women's clubs." GFWC was instrumental in the passage of the original Pure Food and Drug Act and continued to push for food and drug standards to help keep citizens safer.

Anna Pennybacker died on February 4, 1938, in Austin, Texas. Governor James V. Allred ordered the flag over the State Capitol to be lowered to half -staff to honor her "as a woman who has endeared herself to the hearts of all Texans."

1895 Society

Did you know that GFWC Florida has a headquarters building? Located in Lakeland, Florida, the current headquarters building designed specifically for the needs of GFWC Florida, was dedicated in May 1990. Clubs and individuals donated furniture and furnishings for the building that includes office and work space, a kitchen, and space for records storage.

Support and maintenance of this building necessitated the start of the 1895 Society, appropriately named after the year that the Florida Federation was formed. This society raises the "money needed to preserve and protect GFWC Florida's history and headquarters."

Any member can join the 1895 Society by making a donation through the <u>GFWC FL Marketplace</u>, starting at \$18.95.
