Hunger Action Month

September is Hunger Action Month. "This year's campaign will highlight the impact of food on people's lives and show how a meal goes beyond solely nourishing our bodies. When people are fed, futures are nourished, and individuals go from just living to truly thriving. By joining the movement, Feeding America believes our collective voices, actions and commitment will help ensure every community has the food it needs to flourish.

"Food has a tremendous impact on people's lives. We have all experienced firsthand how a meal goes beyond solely nourishing our bodies," said Claire Babineaux-Fontenot, CEO of Feeding America. "Access to nutritious food is essential for each of us to reach our full potential and reminds us that we can all help to create positive change in our communities to ensure that no one goes hungry in America. Now is the time for us to come together to elevate the voices of people who experience food insecurity and inspire everyone to join the movement to end hunger."

Feeding America estimates approximately 1 in 6 people turned to charitable food assistance for additional support in 2022. A recent Feeding America survey found that 80% of network food banks reported either increased or steady demand for emergency food services in June 2023. This includes almost 35% of responding food banks reporting an increase in the number of people served."

What **we're** doing to help...This month we will focus on the organizations in our area that are addressing food insecurity and will culminate on September 30th, with our participation in the first GFWC Day of Service with a food drive at the Viera Walmart. Beyond the Library Walls: Building Communities with Bookmobiles

Library outreach exists in many forms: programming, representing the library at community events, serving senior facilities and home-bound patrons, collaborating with schools, day-care centers, other community organizations, and last but not least, operating outreach vehicles such as bookmobiles, passenger vans and book bikes to reach patrons who are unable to or don't have convenient access to the library.

For over one hundred years bookmobiles have served rural, urban, suburban and tribal areas, bringing access to information and life-long learning resources to all classes and communities. During the late 1800s, women's clubs began advocating for Bookmobiles in the state of Texas and throughout the United States.

Horse riding librarians were the Great Depression's bookmobiles. They brought books to Kentuckians living in remote areas. The novels, "The Bookwoman of Troublesome Creek" and "The Bookwoman's Daughter" talk about the challenges

of traveling to deliver books in every season.

One of the earliest mobile libraries in the United States was a mule drawn wagon carrying wooden boxes of books. It was created in 1904 by the People's Free Library of Chester County, South Carolina and served the rural areas there.

Bookmobiles have expanded to magazines, LPs, CDs, DVDs games and every multimedia item that is found in a central branch. Now they are starting to provide patrons with technology itself.

Georgia Phillips Reading Room

Did you know that Rockledge has a reading and book lending program? The Georgia Phillips Reading and Book Lending Room located in the Rockledge Community Resource Center (123 Barton Blvd.) collects books, games, CDs, DVDs and puzzles. Books can be checked out for up to 21 days. There is no penalty for not returning books. A person can return the books they checked out or return different books.

This is another way for our club members to donate the books we no longer want so that others can read and enjoy them, and to help the people in our community that can't get to a regular library. This facility is open Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday from 10:00 am - 1:00 pm.

Space Coast Woman's Club Book Club

Our club's Book Club will be meeting on the third Monday of every month at 1:00 pm. We will meet in members' homes, rotating around so everyone has a turn to host the meeting and lead the discussion on the book of the month. The hostess will provide simple snacks and drinks.

Start collecting used corks (natural or synthetic) and bring them to any of our general meetings. The Cork Club funded by Widget Co. collect corks and donates .02 per natural cork and donates the money to forest and ocean conservation. They recycle the synthetic cork. September Environmental Tips:

I am trying to minimize the amount of plastic that I use. I use reusable grocery bags, recycle as much as I can and avoid using plastic bottles and containers. I am not always successful but I know that every little bit helps.

In my efforts to reduce my use of plastics I have found a couple of products:

Sheets laundry sheets are a liquid-less detergent (they look like dryer sheets) 50 sheets to a box. I order them through Amazon.

Dropps dishwasher detergent pods – these look just like other detergent pods but the detergent is wrapped in a water soluble wrap rather than plastic.

Both products are packaged in recyclable boxes.

What We've Been Up To...

The Education CSP and Health and Wellness CSP held a "Back to School" Drive during the month of July. We chose three charities that were trying to help many of the children in Brevard County. Grandparents Raising Grandchildren and the Friends of the Children of Brevard County needed school supplies for the children they serve. The Sharing Center of Central Brevard needed new sneakers for their Kicks for Kids campaign.

We told our members, our friends, our neighbors and our communities about our drive and watched as the items poured into our homes. Thirty one days later we tallied all of those donated items and were able to donate \$1,118.00 in school supplies and \$775.00 in new sneakers. It was a very successful project and we are proud to help the children in our community start the school year with new supplies.





Thanks to a donation from a club member, GFWC Space Coast Woman's Club was able to make a donation of two emergency rope ladders for Nana's House. Nana's House is a 501(c)(3) organization that provides local foster families, licensed by One More Child, with housing and wrap around support. They help provide families with housing, utilities, transportation, and resources for kids, as well as household goods, children's clothing, toys, school supplies, diapers, and any other items that they may need.

GFWC History

Mrs. Carolyn Lawrence Pearce was the first GFWC International President to hail from Florida. She served as GFWC President from 1966 to 1968

with great support from her family. As stated in the Miami Herald, "When local, district and state federations endorsed her for the GFWC presidency at the 1965 Florida Federation convention, a surprise telegram made it unanimous: "We would like to lovingly cast unanimous endorsement for our favorite candidate, Carolyn Pearce...Dick, Marilyn, and Frank Pearce."

"Carolyn Pearce was born in Georgia and studied for two years at the University of Georgia before getting married. In 1926 Mrs. Pearce moved to Miami, Florida with her husband and son where she became a member, and eventually President, of the Miami Woman's Club. Over the next several years, she became director of District 11; vice-president of the Florida Federation of Women's Clubs; and, in 1954, state president of the Florida Federation. Impressively, in 1954 Carolyn also received her B.A. in English from the University of Miami.

In 1958 Mrs. Pearce began her work at GFWC, serving as chairman of the Western Hemisphere Division of the International Relations Department, and of the American Home Department and Garden Division. She became GFWC recording secretary in 1960 and moved up in the ranks, becoming 26th International President of GFWC in 1966.

During her term, Carolyn Pearce's theme was "Build With Youth for a Better World." During her administration, Mrs. Pearce didn't ask clubs to focus on a national campaign or fundraising project but instead asked clubs to "walk hand in hand with youth for community betterment through community service." One of the ways Mrs. Pearce promoted this was through membership. Under her administration GFWC formally organized the Juniorettes.

Carolyn Pearce's administration, and her subsequent scrapbooks, also embraced travel, as she visited clubs all over the world. In 1967, she led an Adventure Tour of the Pacific where she stopped in Sydney, Australia. In Australia, Pearce planned a conference for Australian clubwomen and all of the tour participants. Carolyn also visited Germany to mark the 20th anniversary or the Marshall Plan. She was one of only nine people from the United States invited to make the trip.

Carolyn Pearce's scrapbooks detail her experience throughout her 1966-68 administration. They are comprised of personal pictures, magazine and newspaper articles, invitations, memos, and correspondence, including presidential and royal correspondence." (GFWC Women's History and Resource Center)
